OUR FLAT-HEAD FORD A FAMILY VISION FULFILLED

I think I've been to every Palo Alto Concours. But I don't really remember the early ones since I likely came on my dad's shoulders as a toddler.

The Enderby family moved to Palo Alto in 1961 and first lived on Oregon Avenue, before it became Oregon Expressway. One day back in the 10s, while the family was driving home though Los Altos, my dad spotted a 1929 Ford Model A roadster for sale. It was in okay shape, so he bought it. After towing it home, dad got it running. A few years later I took my driver's test in it just for fun when I got my first driver's license.

I think when dad first bought the Model A he hoped his boys would eventually restore the car and bring it to the Palo Alto Concours. But while we were growing up, Dad bought a variety of nice, used sports cars. Although we had "regular" cars, the Model A always had a spot in the garage. After all the boys had moved out, it looked like the Ford was going to get the boot when dad got mom a new Caddy, and she wanted the space in the garage next to dad's Porsche. So I bought the Model A from my dad, as I could not bear to see it leave the family.

Our Model A was in just average shape the first 26 years we owned it. Finally in 2000 I started restoring the Ford. k was a ground-up restoration, but being a true car guy and very much wanting to keep the sense of history, 1 was very careful not to over-restore the car. My hope was that when it was finished, the car would remain authentic and not some piece of art.

No aspect of the car hobby upsets me more than to go to a car show and see a grossly over-restored Model A get an award. Such car events are a disgrace to the history of cars, and that history is lost to the generations that follow. But it takes self control. It's tough to resist the temptation to make the car "better" -- like explaining to a painter or plater/polisher that you really don't want their very best work for every piece of the car. I found this out when my plater incorrectly polished the back sides of my original bumpers. After two attempts to recreate the original finish, I finally had to put those overdone parts aside and get another set.

Finally, 3.1/2 years later, Dad drove our newly restored Model A to the 2004 Palo Alto Concours. It was a very satisfying day for us, the culmination of a long-delayed project that left me feeling like I'd fulfilled a family obligation.

While the Ford is a very nice car now, it still gets driven regularly. In fact, it's my favorite car to run errands and take my volleyball nets to play at the Stanford Oval on weekends. Dad raised us to believe that toys were meant to be played with, and cars were meant to be enjoyed.

I've tried to carry that lesson over to the other cars I own. Today on the Concours field you'll find me organizing the judging for the Ferrari classes. **Kevin Enderby**

SHADE TREE MECHANICS



OVERFLOW BOTTLE

Here is the scenario, it's hot, it's high altitude, you are climbing a mountain. The wife is very nervously watching the temperature gauge. Finally happens, you boil over, and pull over amidst a cloud of steam to let everything cool off.

So, how do folks prevent this scenario, and how do they deal with it if it does occur? First, my own personal experience. I have a 3 quart overflow bottle. My radiator cap is sealed, but the overflow tube is vented to the atmosphere, regular Model A radiator with 10 fins to the inch. I run 50/50 antifreeze which has a boiling point of 223 degrees F at sea level. Even with that high boiling point, I have on occasion boiled the car, again mostly in high altitude, high temperature situations. What I have found is that 3 quarts is about the maximum amount of coolant that can be expelled when a steam bubble forms. When the first 3 quarts is forced out, the path is clear for the steam to exit without taking anymore coolant with it. Now, I do carry a spray bottle of water, and I do not turn the engine off. Shoot the radiator with a few shots from the spray bottle and it is amazing how quickly the boiling ceases. And, when the steam bubble collapses, you can watch the level in the coolant recovery bottle go down very quickly as the coolant flows back into the engine. And, it is not immediately necessary to add coolant, some has been lost, but enough has been saved to keep on going. So, away we go, maybe a little less aggressive on the throttle

I guess if I wanted to move a little farther into the modern world, I would change to a pressurized radiator. Lots of folks have done that, and installed one of the vertical tube recovery tanks which are too small for my liking. Using a 4psi radiator cap on a Brassworks radiator raises the boiling point by 12 degrees.

So the moral of this story is: as many fins per inch as you can get, 50/50 antifreeze (also prevents corrosion), sealed system, nice big overflow bottle, and a good temperature gauge so that you know when to back off on the throttle.


See you on the road, watch out for those hot hills. (and vapor lock, that is another story.)




